Since its inception, the organization has provided culturally and linguistically appropriate programs and services to San Diego refugee and immigrant communities, easing their transition and ensuring successful functioning in their new home.



### **Health & Wellness**

While we provided many health-related services in 2024, our programs were mainly focused on youth and families, support for people with developmental disabilities and their communities, and mental and behavioral health.



# Developmental Disability Services

Our **SHIFA Pediatric Program** supports families with children who have developmental disabilities by helping with intake, psychological assessments, systems navigation, connection to resources, and referrals. In 2024, we conducted workshops for parents and provided them with advocacy and navigation resources.

Our Coordinated Family Support programs also provide culturally and linguistically appropriate support for adults with developmental disabilities.

We conducted 20 literacy workshops and enrolled 12 clients in childhood literacy programs

#### **Early Childhood Literacy**

Our **Early Childhood Literacy Program** assisted children between the ages of 0–5 who have limited literacy and language skills. We offered direct support through various activities, including reading sessions, workshops, and other educational initiatives that included collaborations with parents.

#### **CalAIM Services**

In 2024, we participated in the **California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal (CalAIM)** program. CalAIM allows Medi-Cal to be used for social services to support the whole person, and is a supportive pathway to more sustainable social programs. Many of our clients were able to use CalAIM services for asthma remediation and support from community health workers who assisted them with healthcare navigation.

### **Ihsan Center**

On September 12th, 2024, we celebrated the grand opening of our Ihsan Center. The Ihsan Center is a space for behavioral health and CalAIM services, community gathering, and holistic healing.

#### **Services Offered**

The center offers culturally and linguistically appropriate behavioral health programs and wraparound services including:

- individual therapy
- group therapy
- couples counseling
- adolescent therapy
- family therapy
- workshops on self-discovery, emotional resilience, stress management, and mindfulness



Ihsan Center also supports the wellbeing of SFS staff, who often work directly with clients from their own communities.

#### Infrastructure Support & Capacity Building

The Ihsan Center increases SFS's infrastructure and capacity to provide culturally and linguistically appropriate, trauma informed mental and behavioral health services to local immigrant and refugee communities. This year, we began serving youth and adults and created our secure electronic health records system to support our clients. The Ihsan Center has also started employing clinical and non-clinical direct services staff, and has partnered with the San Diego State University School of Social Work for Clinical Supervision.

We are partnering with Managed Care Plans like Kaiser Permanente, Molina Healthcare of California, and Community Health Group to offer CHW and CalAlM services. This center is not only an important resource for our communities, but is a sustainable social enterprise initiative for SFS.




Figure 1: Number of Mental & Behavioral Health Services Delivered by Type in 2024

# Leadership Training, Community Outreach, & Civic Engagement

Our 2024 youth programs included **Elevate Youth California** and the **Youth Opioid Response Program**. These programs focused on substance use treatment, leadership training, peer outreach, and education.

Youth participated in the **Stop the Hate** program, providing support to those experiencing hate crimes. Youth participated in healing circles, civil rights education, and developed a documentary film.

Youth also participated in civic engagement activities including voter outreach and canvassing.

# Supporting Educational Access


Our Leaders in Our Neighborhood (LION) College Scholars program helped 33 community members to file their Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) paperwork. This supported them in accessing higher education and working toward their goals.

# **Workforce Development**



### **Training the Workforce**

The SHIFA360 Workforce Training
Program caters to the needs of immigrant and refugee populations who want to reskill in the current job market. We currently have 5 unique curricula, and a train-the-trainer model is currently being developed. In 2024, we worked with UC San Diego Extension to prioritize Community Health Worker (CHW) training.

### **200** Community Health Workers certified

### 50 Professional development workshop attendees

Our CHW trainees are members of the communities that we serve. Our CHW training program therefore emphasizes supporting our learners' unique needs by focusing on the 4 pillars of learner success (Figure 3).

The 4 pillars of learner success include wraparound services, flexible teaching techniques that work around learners' busy schedules, real-world activities that can build confidence, and fostering supportive and engaging cohorts to promote a community of practice.

### 2025 Workforce Development Expansion

In 2024, SFS was awarded a Prebys Foundation grant for youth workforce development. In 2025, we will leverage this exciting opportunity and our learner-centered training approach to expand our CHW training program and to develop new Peer Support Specialist trainings for youth age 16–26. We will also be offering an Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR)-funded **Refugee**Career Pathways program primarily for Afghan, Haitian, Syrian, Ukrainian, and Iraqi refugees.


# Supporting Entrepreneurship & Successful Integration

This year, we connected with **1,544 families** through our various programs, providing essential support as they navigate challenges and strive to create a brighter future. We assisted our clients in navigating and applying for public benefits, translation and interpretation, transportation, workforce development, employment, and small business development and expansion.

### **Helping Clients Access Basic Needs**

Our client assistance programs provide direct financial support, access to resources, and case management to ensure clients become self-sufficient, successful community members.

#### Supporting Small Businesses & Refugee Integration

Our **Microenterprise** and **Afghan Family Childcare** Programs empower clients to establish small businesses. Clients receive assistance from career counselors, educational workshops, and a stipend to help cover expenses like licensing fees and trainings. Our ORR-funded **Afghan Refugee Assistance Program (ARAP)** assists recently arrived Afghan individuals to become integrated, self-sufficient members of society through case management, workshops, and other support.


